FALLING IN LOVE WITH THE BIBLE

When I took Old Testament in seminary, my professor wrote in the syllabus the goal of this class was to develop in each of us a "love affair" with the Bible. He wanted us to love reading the Bible— the characters, the storylines, and unexpected plot twists.

And then that professor modeled what he was talking about. He clearly loved the Book of Genesis. We spent the first 6 weeks of an 18 week semester studying the Genesis. And yes, I did fall in love with the first book in the Bible!

This month we will read and learn more about the early stories of Genesis—the creation stories, life in the garden, and Noah's ark. We will look at the two creation stories, found in Genesis 1 and 2. Did you know our Bible holds two distinct creation accounts? The theory is the two stories come from two different writers.

Genesis 1 is written by the Priestly writer, who wrote in beautiful prose. The Priestly writer was concerned about order and time and spoke of a transcendent God. Each day, God created light, the sky, dry land, the sun and moon, fish and birds, animals and humans, and lastly the Sabbath. And at the end of each day of creation, God saw that it was good. This is one of the finest pieces of poetry ever written.

The second creation story begins with Genesis 2:4, in some kind of desert-like chaos. God

created Adam first from the dust of the ground, then the garden, then plants and animals, and lastly Eve. God walked in the garden and talked to the humans, an anthropomorphic God. The writer of this section is referred to as the Yahwehist writer. I like the narrative feel of the Yahwehist writer, it's almost folkloric.

We will continue in the Garden of Eden, the story of the serpent tempting the woman and the woman tempting the man to eat the forbidden fruit. This was written by the Yahwehist writer. And our last story is of Noah and the flood, a Priestly story of punishment and blessings.

Join us to hear these wonderful stories from early Genesis retold throughout the month. Come, hear how in the world I am going to cover Noah's Ark during my Children's Time!

May we all fall more deeply in love with Scripture, maybe even develop our own love affair with the Bible!

2016 APPORTIONMENTS



We are United Methodists, which means we are a part of a larger denomination. Through our conference, we support many important ministries. Some are local,

some are worldwide. These ministries are supported by our church, in the same way leaves are supported by the life-giving tree.

Our church is asked to pay a portion of those financial commitments. This year our full apportionment is \$42,810. Crown Heights UMC pays about a thousand dollar monthly from our budget. Biannually, we send a letter to each member (Easter and Christmas), asking for donations and all those monies go straight to our apportionments. We also give people the opportunity to select a specific ministry to support.

Throughout the month of September, we will be providing lists of the ministries we are asked to support. Read it over, and give to a cause that you personally want to support. Please, use the memo line on your check to tell us where to apply your funds. (If we collect more money for an item than is required for us to pay, we may call you and ask to apply it to another expense.)

See the list below and consider giving to these ministries.

Africa University – \$138.00

This Methodist private university helps African help themselves through quality higher education in schools of agriculture, theology, management, and business. It currently serves 784 students from 16 African countries.

Black College Fund - \$577.00

Since 1865 United Methodists have been supporting 11 historically black colleges in the south central and southeastern parts of the U.S. This includes Langston University here in Oklahoma. Our support helps young people access higher education for their futures. All the colleges are now racially inclusive.

Oklahoma City University - \$2,251.00

Our United Methodist University has helped educate thousands of clergy and lay persons who have become leaders of the church. This offering helps maintain high academic standards and supports student religious life.

Cookson Hills Center - \$172.00

Meri Whitaker is the director of this mission, outpost caring for some of the poorest people in the state of Oklahoma, many of whom are Cherokee.

Criminal Justice and Mercy Ministries - \$632.00

CJAMM provides a holistic ministry to prisoners, ex-prisoners and their families. It includes Redemption Churches, New Day Camps, KAIROS Prison Ministry, John Wesley Charter School, and Exodus Houses.

Campus Ministries – \$1,909.00

This offering supports our 17 United Methodist campus ministries across the state of Oklahoma. These centers provide students opportunities for fellowship, service, spiritual growth, worship, and counseling.

Prevent/Recover Ministries - \$172.00

This ministry provides education relating to drug and dependency issues in local churches and through skill training for pastors and laypersons. It focuses on prevention as well as treatment.

Ministerial Education Fund - \$1,547.00

Helps support the operating cost of United Methodist seminaries, provides scholarships to ministerial students, and supports programs for recruitment and professional development.

St. Paul Seminary - \$618.00

This is the new satellite program now being offered on OCU's campus for people who are feeling called into full-time ordained ministry.

Jurisdictional Administration \$86.00

Our own David Severe is now the Director for the South Central Jurisdictional Office and Programming ministries that reach across conference lines in our area of the country.

Interdenominational Cooperation Fund - \$121.00

United Methodists have always been committed to working in partnership with other denominations and faith-based groups across the country. These funds support those important joint efforts.

General Administration - \$544.00

All ministries require a certain amount of administration costs to help them happen—office staff, postage costs, printing and other expenses.

Restore Hope - \$242.00

Restore Hope Ministries in Tulsa, provides food, clothing, worship, and other support for people who are in need.

OK Indian Missionary - \$345.00

These churches are served by 45 full- and part-time pastors, representing 25 tribes from across the United States. Only three of the churches are self-supporting. Our apportionment dollars are used to help pay salaries for the other 42 pastors.

Project Transformation - \$14.00

The program is designed to connect children with responsible adults who will have a measurable impact on their reading levels, nutrition, cultural awareness, and the quality of their summer activities.

World Service Fund - \$6,466.00

The World Service Fund is the essential core of our global outreach ministry, under-writing Christian mission around the world. By giving to World Service we empower United Methodist evangelistic efforts ... stimulate Bible study and spiritual commitment ... encourage church growth and discipleship ... and help God's children everywhere.

Mt. Sequoyah Assembly Grounds - \$44.00

This is our beautiful jurisdictional retreat center in Fayetteville, Arkansas, the site of many training events for laity and clergy.

Lydia Patterson Institute - \$183.00

Our United Methodist day school at El Paso provides Mexican youth with cross-cultural education and prepares them for college.

Hispanic Ministries \$ 345.00

This fund helps us minister to and with the rapidly growing Hispanic community in areas across our state.

Camps and Conferences - \$705.00

Fees from campers cover about 90% of the cost of operating our three conference camps, Canyon, Egan, and Cross Point. This fund helps make up the difference to keep camp fees as low as possible.

Board of Ordained Ministry \$ 360.00

The Board of Ordained Ministry is responsible for supporting persons who respond to God's call to professional ministry as an Elder, Deacon, Licensed Local Pastor, or other certified and licensed ministry options.

Neighborhood Services Organization - \$52.00

Provides emergency services for low-income people, including housing for the homeless, education for homeless children, and nutritional services.

Equitable Compensation Fund - \$575.00

Supplements of pastors of congregations so they will receive the established minimum salary of the conference.



This is your chance to REALLY make a difference in a child's life, in a child's future, in this community!!! God calls us to many things, is this where God is calling you now?


