Praise God, from Whom All Blessings Flow

Before Charles Wesley or Isaac Watts there was Thomas Ken who has been called "England's first hymnist." He was born in 1637 in Little Berkhampstead on the fringes of greater London. When his parents died, he raised by his half-sister and her husband who enrolled him in Winchester College, an historic boys' school. Thomas was later ordained to the ministry and returned to Winchester as a chaplain.

To encourage the devotional habits of the boys, Thomas wrote three hymns in 1674. This was revolutionary because English hymns had not yet appeared. Only the Psalms were sung in public worship. Ken suggested the boys use the hymns privately in their rooms.

One hymn was to be sung upon waking, another at bedtime, and a third at midnight if sleep didn't come. His morning hymn had thirteen stanzas, beginning with:

Awake, my soul, and with the sun thy daily stage of duty run; Shake off dull sloth and joyful rise, to pay the morning sacrifice.

Back in seminary at the start of each class for Christian History, we sang to the theologian we would study that day. The song was always the same, the name in the verse would change. For example:

Give me that old time religion, give me that old time religion, give me that old time religion, it's good enough for me! It was good enough for Augustine, it was good enough for Augustine, it was good enough for Augustine, it's good enough for me!

I loved being reminded that we find ourselves in a long tradition of faithful people. Their faith teaches us and supports us in our faith.

Throughout the month of August, we will be celebrating That Old Time Religion with a revival feel in our worship. We will be singing some of the old songs, and I will provide the history of how those songs came about. Below is the story of The Doxology. Our scripture lessons will each be about a little know biblical character. From Ehud and Samson, to Mephibosheth and Rhoda— these almost forgotten stewards of faith have something to teach us. So let's gather 'round and hear these old stories!

As we worship together this month, I hope we get washed over in the spirit of a revival, where the songs and scriptures lesson will come to life for us, and we will celebrate That Old Time Religion once again!

His evening hymn, equally meaningful, included this verse: All praise to Thee, my God, this night, for all the blessings of the light! Keep me, O keep me, King of kings, beneath Thine own almighty wings.

All three hymns ended with a common stanza, which has since become the most widely-sung verse in the world.

Praise God, from Whom all blessings flow; Praise Him, all creatures here below; Praise Him above, ye heavenly host; Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.

In 1680, Thomas was appointed chaplain to England's King Charles II. It was a thankless job, as Charles kept a variety of mistresses. Once the king asked to lodge a mistress in the chaplain's residence. Thomas rebuked him saying, "Not for the King's Kingdom!" Afterward the king referred to him as "that little man who refused lodging to poor Nellie."

During the reign of the next king, James II, Thomas by now a bishop, was sent to the Tower of London for his Protestant convictions. After his release, Thomas retired to the home of a wealthy friend where he died on March 11, 1771. He was buried at sunrise, and the Doxology was sung at his funeral. UPCOMING EVENTS - CONTINUED:

Proposed Structural Change for Crown Heights UMC

In Reggie McNeal's book called Kingdom Come, he reminds us Christ came to build his Kingdom on earth and the church is a tool to do that work. But we must remember Christ didn't come to save the church but the world. McNeal tells the story of an attorney in a church, who served the church faithfully. He served on every lay committee. But all the while, the man wanted to truly engage with the mission of God. Too often when people enter the church to serve God, we are only able to help them serve the church.

Crown Heights United Methodist Church is looking at changing our church structure so that we can better serve the Kingdom of God. We want mission and ministry to drive our church. This is where people find Christ. Of course, we still need people to commit to the administration of the church, as well.

Being proposed is a single board model. We propose a Ministry Resource Team (consisting of 13 people) be charged with resourcing and supporting the vision and mission of our church. Their job is to oversee the finances, facilities, staff, and all administrative workings of the church. A Nominating Committee is to name members to the Ministry Resource Team. Task force groups will support the Ministry Resource Team with the work of overseeing finances, improving our building, and implementing ministries programs.

The details of the proposed structure will be distributed through Admin Council or the church office. If you have interest in how we better organize, read what is proposed for our church. Share your comments with Julie Williams, Janet Basler, or Trina Bose North. We are doing this work hopefully to enable more people to do ministry, while preserving the integrity of our operations.

Mission Trip

December 26-30, 2017 to Sunflower, Mississippi

Five years ago, Rev. Veronica Pritchard was appointed to a tiny church in Sunflower, MS. She was there to close the doors; they were just too small. But when she arrived, Veronica saw the needs of the poor community surrounding the church and got to work instead. She helped transform her church into a center where mission teams come to work on the homes in their area. Veronica says, "Delta Grace is a year-round mission hub that provides beds, showers, kitchen facilities, and mission opportunities for mission teams. Teams work on homes of many who have lost hope and do not know what tomorrow brings. Our purpose is to match mission teams with mission work within an hour's drive. Our prayer is that the volunteers will transform the lives of those they serve and in turn have their lives transformed." Check out their website at deltagrace.org.

Crown Heights UMC is looking into forming a mission team to go to Sunflower, Mississippi. We will leave Tuesday December 26, returning Saturday December 30, 2017. We will drive to Mississippi and stay in the Delta Grace dorms. We will do light construction work for three days before returning home. The cost person is \$325. All ages are welcome.

WHO CAN YOU CALL TO TALK TO ABOUT HELPING? Janet

RJ and Jeremiah are two boys who were friends for a long time. When they were younger they played active games together anytime they could get away from the adults in their lives, and sometimes even around the adults in their lives.

Neither one had a male role model in their lives, but they enjoyed being little boys together, doing little boy things like running, and laughing, and making up stories, and getting into a little trouble here and there.

At school neither one could read very well. They acted up during times when they were expected to read. Then they were introduced to two adults who gave their time to Whiz Kids.

On Thursday afternoons, RJ and Jeremiah were each the center of attention for one adult. They were accepted for the little boys they were, and they had a chance to figure out what they could actually read, and learn more. Sometimes it meant walking around the building just writing down what they saw, then reading those words over and over. Sometimes it meant listening to a soothing voice read an adventure story. The one thing they knew was - they were important enough for an adult to spend time with them. They also had a chance each week to learn about God and Jesus during their small group Club Time. They asked many questions, and learned those wonderful stories by heart.

Eventually they outgrew Whiz Kids, and their tutors moved on to love other Whiz Kids. RJ & Jeremiah became model students in middle school. One still struggled with school, while one did well in honors classes. They remained friends, laughing, and playing around. But they also became well respected people in their school, taking on many responsibilities, and carrying them out with smiles and success.

They both remembered being Whiz Kids and asked to be able to come back. Hopefully, they will be able to do just that, as tutors, in a few years. It happens with Whiz Kids. They know the value of an older person being there week after week for them. They know what it is like to be cared for, no matter how well you read. And they know how much it helps to have someone help, just you, with one of the hardest things you have to learn.

Can you be a Whiz Kids tutor this year? I hope so. It takes 2 hours on Thursday afternoons, and the willingness to be there for a kid. Call Janet, to talk about the possibilities.




After church on July 23, we took 14 kids and youth to the splash pad at Memorial Park. It was a good time watching our kids run around and play!
