Silence and exuberant sounds both echo through the Arts Academy on Wednesdays. During a telling of the Bible story of Job one evening only the story could be heard. No one was whispering to their neighbor, no one was singing, only Job and his wonderful relationship with God could be heard.

Shortly afterward a saxophone breaks out in soothing notes that flow down the halls and out to the next building. Upstairs a group of girls work their looms amid a chorus of giggles and girl stories, interspersed with moments of total silent concentration on getting just the right look for their ever-growing woven creations.

In other rooms pianos and guitars ring with familiar tunes then abruptly stop while teachers very quietly explain how fingers could move differently to make it easier to hit the right notes, and the pressure from those fingers could change to make the songs more enjoyable to hear. The boys in the drum room beat out rhythms one minute, are silent the next as the teacher explains a pattern, then giggle loudly as they try the new pattern and manage to get a small part of it correct.

Upstairs the young clay sculptors are very quiet as they mold their clay and talk with Jamie about their lives at home and school. But every so often laughter as well as frustration is heard from them as the clay just doesn't do what they envision it should, at least not YET.

What a joy it is to witness this wonderful cacophony of sounds and quiet working each week. Knowing that young children, older teens, and adults are working together to create things of beauty and memories with each other in our church is truly a blessing.

Whiz Kids by Janet Basler

The smells of homemade chicken noodle soup, or homemade individual pizzas, or nachos, or cinnamon rolls greet our Whiz Kids each week as the tutors bring them to the church from school. Soon they are sitting at tables with other Whiz Kids and their tutors eating a big snack and telling each other about their days.

After snack time comes the time for reviewing the six Whiz Kids rules. Sometimes we do that with humor, sometimes with seriousness, and sometimes with dancing. Then the Star of the Week is introduced by their tutor. We learn how kind, and motivated our Whiz Kids are. We learn what they want to be when they are grown (a lot of doctors and teachers so far). We learn how much their tutors admire, and love their Whiz Kids, and how that is returned by their Whiz Kid.

Then the real fun begins - reading together!!! We see some tutors reading with expression while the Whiz Kid points out which words they missed. We hear some Whiz Kids reading with expression, while the tutors laugh at the funny parts, and ask questions at the hard parts. We hear small groups of tutors and Whiz Kids playing reading games together, laughing and encouraging each other as the game gets intense. We hear kids tell of the books they've read as they earn Scholar Dollars to be given out at the end of the year.

At one point during our time together the kids gather to hear a Bible Story, while their tutors get ideas on new ways to help their kids with reading. Many of the kids get to help tell the stories they are learning so well. Tutors and coordinators share ideas of things they've found works with helping kids read.

After spending a little under 2 hours together, the whistle blows in the hallways, and everyone leaves - always with the snack Charlene has left for them. The tutors have one last chance to connect with their kids on the way home, then say, "Goodbye, and I'll see you next week."

Whiz Kids has to be one of the best, if not the best, ministries/programs ever designed to help at-risk kids learn to read better, and even more importantly, know they are wonderful, competent, and loved people. Maybe <u>that</u> is the key to the power of Whiz Kids in these young lives. It's a lot easier to learn to read when someone like a Whiz Kids tutor knows you can, and is willing to be there each week to help you know it yourself.

We currently have 28 Whiz Kids at our church each Thursday. We have space, food, books, and games for more. We just need more tutors to reach more kids. Maybe that is you?
