COVID-19 Update

Dr. Paul Bicket is a longtime member of our church and a retired anesthesiologist. This is what he wants us to know about Covid-19:

"What Efforts Are You Doing to Stay Safe"
COVID-19 positive cases are rising in many states at this point, including Oklahoma.
Many thought the virus might be seasonal but from current research it appears that it is not seasonal. The best approach to staying safe (what Colleen and I are doing) is to limit your exposure with others by wearing a mask (face covering) and staying at least 6 feet apart if you must interact with others.

Paul recommends this write-up, as a reminder of how to avoid the virus:

From an AMA interview with Hannah Kirking, MD, medical epidemiologist, Division of Viral Diseases, CDC

The primary form of transmission of COVID-19 is person to person. Person to person transmission is essentially when someone talks or speaks or coughs, they create little droplets. Social distancing is the number one way to prevent transmission. It essentially limits your ability to be hit with anyone else's droplet. If that droplet is either inhaled by someone or hits mucous membranes, that's when transmission occurs. The mainstay of prevention remains social distancing, which means keeping six feet from other people, as well as minimizing the number of people that you come into contact with. It also means wearing masks or face coverings (as they should be called) to essentially reduce exposure. If someone might be sick, whether they know it or not, it reduces their ability to transmit the virus to others. This is called source control.

The mainstay of what we're doing right now and trying to get people to do is maintain the social distancing, and wear face coverings when needed or when appropriate. The other thing we haven't talked a whole lot about is really good hand hygiene. Our hands are our way of interacting with the environment. And so it sounds like an old kindergarten adage, but "wash your hands" is still largely really good advice for us.

Church Face Covering and Distancing

As we gather at the church, we are asking everyone to wear a mask and maintain social distance. There are adjustments, especially distancing at church. But as people come into the church building and gather for Outdoor Worship, everyone has been great. A BIG thank you to all our members for cooperating so well and keeping one another safe.

The picture below is Jim and Pam Rust with their granddaughter, Dylan. They mask up with one another and maintain distance. Just seeing each other brings smiles to their faces—you'll have to trust me!



You are invited to take part in reading *The Upper Room Daily Devotions*. *The Upper Room* shares a daily scripture verse, short devotion, and prayer. It is a good moment of centering for our faith. Many in our church are already familiar with these devotions.

You can access *The Upper Room* by uploading the app, reading online, or asking the Church Office for a booklet.

To upload the app on to your smart phone, you will need to create a sign in. The first month is free (30 days of devotions free), after that it's \$1.99 for a month. Through the app, there is an option of having the devotion read aloud, so you can listen in your car.

To read online, go to <u>upperroom.org</u>, click on tab called "Daily," click on "Daily Devotion."

To get your hands on a book, call the Church Office and ask Susan to mail one to you. We have 6 copies available.

If you would like to go deeper, join us for **Zoom meetings** on Sunday evenings at 7 pm, focusing on the week's Upper Room devotions. We can choose one from the week to read together and discuss the lesson being taught. Anyone is welcome to the Zoom conversation. Monthly Mission

Kits help make all the difference between sickness and health for struggling families.

This year as hurricane season approaches, they are low on Hurricane Kits. We can help by assembling some kits and mailing them CWS's distribution centers.



List for Hurricane Kits

Let's commit to making 5 kits. What item can you shop? Let Trina know.

- Five dust masks (x 5)
- Four scouring pads (x 5)
- 5 scrub brushes
- Two pairs non-surgical gloves (x 5)
- 5 packages of 48-50 clothespins
- 5 clotheslines, two 50 ft. or one 100 ft.
- Seven sponges, including one large (x 5)
- Eighteen reusable cleaning towels (e.g. Easy Wipes) (x 5)
- 5, 16-28 oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap
- 5, 12-16 oz. bottles of household cleaner that can be mixed with water (no spray bottles)
- 5, 50 oz. or two 25 oz. bottles of liquid laundry detergent
- 5 pairs work gloves, cotton with leather palm or all leather
- 24-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags (x 5)
- 5, 6-9 oz. bottles of non-aerosol insect repellent

Ministry Resource Team Update

The Ministry Resource Team met on July 22, 2020 to make decisions for our church. First, know with our state's rising COVID-19 cases, we continue to feel it is unsafe to resume Sanctuary worship. We will offer Outdoor Worship and videos on Facebook and our webpage.

Our church supported the Bee Removal and following repairs splendidly. Thank you. The total cost was \$4,700, and we raised \$6,700. The extra money will go to our next Trustee project, which is already becoming clear. An HVAC unit for the Youth Activity building has died. It needs to be replaced and the location, on the top of the roof, needs to be changed. Costs are coming in, but it is nice that we have some funds with which to start.

An update from our chair of Finance, Lee Endicott:


After four months of Covid-19, I am pleased to announce that Crown Heights is in very good shape financially. Our members have done an excellent job of keeping their pledges current. Many have gone above and beyond pledging by addressing special needs including missions, the bee removal project and yard expense. Through the first six months of 2020, we are operating at a net profit of \$26,983, which would be great even if we weren't dealing with Covid-19. However, the year is not over and unfortunately, neither is Covid-19. We also recently learned that we will be facing a significant expense after one of our air conditioning units went out. For these reasons, please continue to keep your pledges current so that Crown Heights can continue doing God's work.


Voter Registration
